	Plague Symptoms	
1. Fever		

- 2. Vomitting
- 3. Buboes painful swellings on the neck, armpits and groin
- 4. Bruises and blisters
- 5. Coughing up blood

Plague Remedies

- 1. 'Cures' for the plague included the letters 'abracadabra' written in a triangle, a lucky hare's foot, dried toad, leeches, and pressing a plucked chicken against the plague-sores until it died.
- 2. Houses where someone got the plague were shut up, and marked with a red cross. 'God have mercy upon us' was written on the door.
- 3. Fires in the streets to purify the air.
- 4. People carried bottles of perfume and wore lucky charms.

Timeline of the Great Fire of London 1am – The fire begins 3am - The Lord Mayor goes to look at the fire, but decides it is not too bad, so goes back to bed 1. Sunday 2nd 7am - The fire has spread September 11am - The Mayor orders the pulling 1666 down of houses, having been instructed by the King, who was informed by Samuel Pepys 3pm - The King sails down the River Thames to observe the fire 2. Monday 3rd The government order fire posts to be set September 1666 3. Tuesday 4th September The fire reaches its peak. 1666 4.Wednesday The wind changes direction, blowing the 5th September fire towards the River Thames. 1666 5. Thursday 6th September The final fires are extinguished. 1666

Signifiant People during the Great Fire

- 1. Thomas Farriner Owner of the bakery in Pudding Lane where the fire started.
- 2. Thomas Bludworth Lord Mayor of London, famous for not taking the fire seriously and going back to bed.
- 3. Samuel Pepys Wrote about the event in his diary, and reported the fire to the King.
- 4. Charles II The King at the the time, he sailed down the Thames to see the fire.
- 5. Sir Christopher Wren The architect who redesigned London after the fire.
