Vocabulary	
1. Tributary	A river flowing into a main river. The tributary does not meet the sea
2. Confluence	The part where 2 rivers meet - typically of equal size
3. Banks	The land alongside a river - often sloping
4. Flood walls	A concrete wall put up on the bank of a river to prevent the river overflowing
5. Port	Town/city with a harbour where ships can dock
6. Harness	Make use of natural resources to make energy - "Harness the power"
7. Import	To bring goods into a country
8. Export	To sell goods to other countries
9. Wetlands	Land consisting of marshes and swamps
10. Strait	A narrow passage of water connecting to seas or oceans
11. Peninsula	A piece of land almost surrounded by water or projecting out into a body of water
12. Mainland	A large continuous piece of land

The Mediterranean Sea

- The Mediterranean Sea touches three continents: Europe, Asia and Africa
- 2. The strait of Gibraltar connects the Mediterranean Sea to the Atlantic Ocean
- 3. The Mediterranean Sea contains two more seas: Balearic Sea and the Aegean Sea
- 4. 21 countries have coastlines on The Mediterranean Sea
- 5. The Mediterranean Sea is an enclosed sea: almost entirely closed in

Cologne: City on the Rhine

- 1. 2000 years ago the Romans built a settlement on the Rhine
- 2. Originally a village, grew to a town and developed into a city it does have a cathedral
- Cologne has lots of bridges people can live and work on both sides of the river
- 4. Cologne is famous for its Christmas markets
- Flood walls had to be built as Cologne is the most likely city in Europe to flood



Rotterdam: City on the Rhine

- 1. Rotterdam is a port at the mouth of the river
- 2. Often called the "Gateway to Europe" as goods are delivered here and then transported across Europe
- There is a large wind farm here as it is very windy in the North Sea which the Rhine flows into
- Rotterdam imports and exports lots of goods all over the world, not just in Europe



The Suez Canal

- 1. Located in Egypt
- Built to reduce shipping transport times to Europe avoiding the dangerous water off Cape of Good Hope in South Africa
- 3. Connects the Mediterranean with the Indian Ocean
- 4. There are no locks on this canal
- 5. Around 50 ships sail through the Suez Canal every day.



Did you know....?

The UK's longest River; The Severn (220 miles) plus The Thames (215 miles) would still **NOT** be as long as the Rhine at 764 miles long!
